- 1. Invocation by PDG Bob Mitchell.
- 2. <u>Call to Order</u> DG Vince Rosen called the meeting to order at 1:24 pm and noted that Protocol had previously been established.
- Cabinet Minutes from April Meeting District Secretary Sean Bryan presented the attached report.
  He presented the minutes from the July 15, 2022 Cabinet Meeting for approval, which were previously emailed to the Cabinet members. The minutes were accepted without comment or revision by DG Vince Rosen.
- 4. <u>Treasurer Report</u> District Treasurer Lion Don Noblit presented the <u>attached report</u>, which had been previously emailed to the Cabinet members. With additional funds received after report prepared, the District has a surplus of \$3,854. The report was accepted without comment or revision by DG Vince Rosen.
- 5. <u>Constitution and Bylaws</u> PDG Tom Westerman had no report, but expects some changes will be necessary as a result of changes to LCI forms. DG Vince Rosen noted that he had seen material changes by LCI in the forms of District Constitutions and Bylaws and expected that District 2-E2 would need to incorporate significant modifications to the District Constitution and Bylaws for the Convention to approve.
- 6. <u>Sports Extravaganza</u> PDG Tom Westerman reported that Sports Extravaganza is scheduled for October 28-29, 2022, at Nimitz High School.
- 7. GMT District Coordinator PDG Mary Alice Layland presented the attached report.

- 10. <u>GMA</u> IPDG Stan Hall reported that the Global Membership Approach process had been partially used last year world-wide (including 2 Districts in Texas) which generated growth, but will formally be rolled out to all this year. The program is to be discussed at the PDG and Zone Chair meetings following the Cabinet Meeting.
- 11. Zone Reports (presided by 1st VDG Woody Mathews):
  - a. DG Vince Rosen determined that the substance of the reports had been addressed in the Round Table Discussion in the morning session (see Addendum A <u>attached</u>). The Zone Chairs present had no additions.

- 12. Entity Reports (presided by 1st VDG Woody Mathews):
  - a. <u>Texas Lions Camp</u>
    - i. PDG Tom Hayford reported that 12 buildings have been constructed on Eagle Trail. All new construction is designed for four seasons, not just summer. The camp hired a new vice president to work on having the camp used all year to bring in additional revenue. Camp dates are on the TLC website and he also noted that the last 2 weeks in July will be devoted to four family sessions.
    - ii. <u>Texas Lions Camp Bus Program</u> PDG John Paul Burnett reported that the camp has not yet decided if the bus would be viable in 2023. The bus costs about \$5000/week and District Treasurer Don Noblit noted that the District has \$24,609 available for the bus. If the bus is not permitted, then the District could consider using some of the funds as financial aid to families to travel to the camp next summer.

      DG Vince Rosen noted that the District is looking for someone to step up to replace PDG.
      - DG Vince Rosen noted that the District is looking for someone to step up to replace PDG John Paul Burnett in supervising the TLC bus program. A club could take over from the District.
  - b. MD-2 Texas Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center PDG John Paul Burnett reported that the TLERC only has funds to run until mid-Spring of 2023. AARP is considering providing some assistance

- to enable TLERC to subsidize its employees. He asked if Clubs would consider donating to TLERC.
- c. <u>Leader Dog</u> PDG John Paul Burnett reported that the incoming District Governors visited the Leader Dog facility in September. He noted there are at least 45 Leader Dogs in the State of Texas, and they cost approximately \$50,000 per dog over their entire life, paid for by Lions.
- d. Lions Organ & Eye Bank LOEB President PDG Bob Appel presented the attached report.
- e. <u>Julian C. Hyer Youth Camp</u> JCH President/1<sup>st</sup> VDG Woody Mathews reported that the program had 13 participants from 7 countries, of which 4 were legacy campers. They are looking for two campers from Texas for 2023 for the youth contest. They need at least three more host families from District 2-E2 for 2023 and would like to have 18 participants in 2023.
- f. Texas Lions Foundation PDG Ron Layland presented the attached report.
- g. <u>Drug Awareness Council</u> DAC President Lion Denny Hilleren reported that DAC awarded five \$500 matching grants to Clubs (Colleyville, Saginaw, NE Tarrant, Argyle, and NW Tarrant) for Red Ribbon Week. They have distributed 18,500 drug awareness stickers to hand out to kids.
- h. <u>Lions Clubs International Foundation</u> PDG Charles Bethards presented the <u>attached report</u> and discussed the District's participation in Campaign 100. He also discussed the availability of District Community Grants for Clubs who give at least \$5000 to LCIF in a year and noted that it is very easy to get.
- i. World Services for the Blind IPDG Stan Hall announced that WSB celebrated its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary with a dinner in Little Rock, AR on September 22, and several Lions from the District attended. He noted that the WSB CEO resigned to work for Lighthouse for the Blind in San Francisco, and that WSB has already hired a replacement CEO.
- j. Eyeglass Recycling Center Lion Courtenay Martin reported that activity has picked up, and about 1500 pairs of glasses have been distributed this fiscal quarter to missions, and reading glasses have been provided to the Presbyterian Night Shelter. ERC has a full complement of 11 directors but as a working board is looking for new younger candidates as some directors are term-limited in the next year. They would like to have a capability to assemble glasses and are looking at possible future expansion to provide local services. Collection boxes are available and he is available to make presentations to Clubs.
- Lions Quest –Lion Juneria Berges presented the <u>attached report</u>.

### 13. Committee Reports (presided by 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG Deb Lewis):

- a. <u>Convention Chair</u> –1<sup>st</sup> VDG Woody Mathews reported that dates for 2023-24 quarterly District meetings have not been set, other than that the fall meeting on October 14 is expected to be McKinney.
- b. <u>Credentials/Election</u> PDG David Gramm reported that to date no letters for candidates for 2023-24 have been received, and that letters must be received no later than 30 days in advance of the April 15, 2023 District convention. This includes candidates for DG, 1<sup>st</sup> VDG, 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG and District entities such as DAC, ERC, and JCH and for Texas Lions Camp.
- c. <u>Directory</u> PDG Carolyn Gramm reported that she has received some updates but not enough to republish the directory immediately.
- d. Opportunities for Youth Contest 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG Deborah Lewis presented the attached report.
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG Deb Lewis reported for Lion Michelle Greco that the Peace Poster contest is receiving a lot of inquiries and has emailed Club presidents to remind them of the deadlines.
  - ii. Lion Mike Lueckenhoff reported they are looking for one more judge for the Outstanding Youth Contest.
- e. <u>Diabetes Awareness</u> Diabetes Coordinator Sean Bryan presented the <u>attached report</u>.
- f. <u>Communications</u> Communications Chair Lion Deb Cashen reported that a newsletter is circulated via email twice a month and encourages Clubs to submit content both for it and for the District Facebook page to aid increasing Lion visibility. She is able to help Clubs to improve social media and advertising for events.
- g. <u>USA/Canada Forum</u> 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG Deb Lewis reported that it was held in Calgary, Canada on September 15-17, 2022, and there were a number of District 2-E2 attendees. The 2023 Forum will be in Reno, Nevada.
- 14. Old Business State Convention DG Vince Rosen reported on the 2023 State Convention being hosted by District 2-E2 on May 18-20, 2023. The Sheraton will be renovating its meeting and banquet facilities in April-June 2023 and so he is exploring alternatives, such as use of the Texas A&M Law School for meetings and a circus-style tent in the back parking lot for meals.

#### 15. New Business.

a. <u>LCIF Grant – Sherman</u> – The Sherman Noon Lions Club and Sherman Evening Lions Club jointly have applied to LCIF for a matching grant to fund, in partnership with the City of Sherman Parks Department, the creation of a playground in the City of Sherman, Texas that is accessible for children with special needs. The estimated cost is \$201,000 and a grant from \$47,000

from LCIF will be requested. A motion to approve the grant request was made by Lion Don Noblit and the motion was seconded by Lion Mike Lueckenhoff. The motion passed.

- b. <u>Resolutions</u> Lion Pam Eckmann presented a recognition for the Crown of Life Lutheran Church as the venue for the District meeting.
- c. <u>LCIF Grant District</u> DG Vince Rosen stated that District 2-E2 would take advantage of a new LCIF grant program for pediatric cancer projects and will apply for a matching grant from LCIF to benefit the Cook Children's Hospital Pediatric Cancer Wing in Fort Worth, Texas by renovating/rebuilding the middle school/high school activity room for patients receiving treatment. The expected cost is \$50,000 and a grant for \$25,000 will be requested, with the balance to be funded by District Clubs. A motion to approve the grant request was made by PDG David Schneider and the motion was seconded by Lion Deb Cashen. The motion passed.
- 16. Closing Remarks by DG Vince Rosen.
- 17. Benediction by PDG Bob Mitchell.







## Report for 2<sup>nd</sup> Leadership Meeting – District 2-E2

#### October 15, 2022

- 1. **Diabetes Education**. I spoke at the meeting of the Sherman Evening Lions Club on August 22, 2022 regarding diabetes and the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation.
- 2. Webinars. MD-2 continues to have monthly webinars on diabetes and other related health matters.
- 3. JDRF Walk/Texas Lions Camp. I am working with the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation and Texas Lions Camp for TLC to have a table at the JDRF annual Walk on November 12 to advertise the TLC's weeks for children with type 1 diabetes.
  - Also, I have worked with JDRF to maximize the contributions made by the District. We have established a District 2-E2 walk team, to which all the 100% Club contributions to JDRF are credited; the District team is 4<sup>th</sup> in the corporate category and 11<sup>th</sup> overall as of today.
