Lunch Awards Session

1. IPDG Stan Hall presented the Club of the Year Award to the Glen Rose Lions Club, who added a net 22 new members.
2. PDG Mary Alice Layland presented LCIF awards on behalf of PDG Charlie Bethards, recognizing Pantego, Lewisville and Greater Arlington as Model Clubs.
3. IPDG Stan Hall installed the 2022-23 District 2-E2 officers.

Cabinet Meeting

29 signed in attendance

1. Call to Order - DG Vince Rosen called the meeting to order at 1:46 pm and noted that Protocol had previously been established.
2. Cabinet Minutes from April Meeting – District Secretary Sean Bryan presented the attached report. He presented the minutes from the April 23, 2022 Cabinet Meeting for approval, which were previously emailed to the Cabinet members. The minutes were accepted without comment or revision by DG Vince Rosen.
3. Treasurer Report – District Treasurer Lion Don Noblit presented the attached report, which had been previously emailed to the Cabinet members. He noted that IPDG Stan Hall ended up with a \$11 surplus. The report was accepted without comment or revision by DG Vince Rosen.
4. Budget – Budget Chair Lion Mike Lueckenhoff presented the attached proposed budget for FY 2022-23, which had been previously emailed to the Cabinet members. He noted that the proposed budget increased slightly for both income and expenses, and that the State Convention fund had been moved into a segregated account as approved at the April Cabinet meeting. Lion Mike Lueckenhoff moved that the budget be approved, and PDG Tom Hayford seconded the motion; the motion was approved.

5. Constitution and Bylaws – PDG Tom Westerman noted that there were currently no pending or expected modifications to the District Constitution and Bylaws.
6. Sports Extravaganza – PDG Tom Westerman reported that Sports Extravaganza was tentatively being scheduled for October 2022, if District 2-X1 approves its participation. They intend to reach out to neighboring states as well.
7. GMT – District Coordinator PDG Mary Alice Layland presented the attached report.

She also presented the attached report on the 2021-22 District service project for Cook Children's Hospital.

DG Vince Rosen then announced a District service for 2022-23, to collect \$20-25,000 from the District Clubs that would qualify for a LCIF matching grant related to pediatric cancer to provide iPads in the rooms at Cook Children's Hospital. This is subject to Cook's approval and the grant application would need to be submitted by the end of 2022.

8. GMA – IPDG Stan Hall had no report, but noted that the program would be pushed down to the Clubs his year. This will involve an assessment of community needs and adjustment of service projects to meet the needs.
9. GLT – District Coordinator/CC/PDG Suzi Schneider noted that there was good turnout for the officer training in the morning. She and District Communications Director Deb Cashen will be doing Zoom officer training on future dates to be determined shortly.
10. GST – 2nd VDG Deb Lewis presented the attached report.
11. Communications – Communications Director Deb Cashen was absent. See report by PDG Tom Hayford below.
12. Zone Reports (presided by 1st VDG Woody Mathews):
 - a. Zone 8 – Zone Chair Deb Lewis gave the attached report.
 - b. Zone 9 – Zone Chair Michelle Greco gave the attached report.
 - c. Zone 7 – Zone Chair Mike Lueckenhoff gave the attached report.
 - d. Zone 6 – Zone Chair Denny Hilleren gave the attached report.
 - e. Zone 4 – New Zone Chair Clayton Meissner reported he is working to connect with the Clubs in his Zone.
 - f. Zone 3 – New Zone Chair Rebeka Ecker reported that she is meeting with the Clubs in her Zone. She did note that:
 - i. She will be attending The Colony Club's officer installation.
 - ii. McKinney Morning Pride just celebrated its 20 year anniversary, had received 2 proclamations from the City of McKinney, had provided a \$500 scholarship to each of the three high schools in McKinney ISD, will be conducting a vision

screening on July 21 for adults, is conducting a shotgun raffle, and ended the fiscal year with a positive membership.

- iii. McKinney Noon was asked to do vision screening for kindergarteners in August, continues to collect food for a local food pantry, do student of the month for each high school, has given \$4000 in scholarships to graduating high school seniors (criteria is vision or hearing impaired), participated in a Project Graduation, and helped the City Church for Youth feed youth during spring break.
- g. Zone 1 – Past Zone Chair Charlie Brown gave the attached report.

13. Entity Reports (presided by 1st VDG Woody Mathews):

- a. Texas Lions Camp
 - i. PDG John Paul Burnett, as a camp director, noted that he is available to do programs on the camp. Construction continues, they hope to open the camp fully next year, and the camp is trying to expand the use of its facilities to corporations for their programs to expand its presence.
 - ii. Lion Robert Duckworth reported that he is collecting checks for golf flag sponsorships and that there is a waiting list to participate in the golf tournament in August. This year, 224 families registered for camp for 2022, with 898 people, and there is a waiting list.
 - iii. Past TLC President Rick Stoorza reported participation by the 2-E2 directors as 100% directors; new director PDG Tom Hayford went down for VIP weekend.
 - iv. DG Vince Rosen reported that the camp has, to date, \$70,000 from the District for a new 2-bedroom, 2-bath cottage, and he expects to take at least another \$17,400 to Kerrville in August.
 - v. Texas Lions Camp Bus Program – PDG John Paul Burnett reported that the camp has not decided if the bus would be viable in 2023 due to Covid concerns. A decision is expected by October, but the funds are available to proceed for several weeks of service next year.
- b. Julian C. Hyer Youth Camp – JCH President/1st VDG Woody Mathews reported that the program reduced the number of participants to 13 on purpose, and that he is looking for more participation by District 2-E2 host families for 2023. The goal for 2023 is 20 participants, with 5 hosts from 2-X1 and 5 hosts from 2-E2.
- c. Texas Lions Foundation – PDG Ron Layland gave the attached report.
- d. Lions Organ & Eye Bank – LOEB President PDG Bob Appel submitted the attached report.
- e. Drug Awareness Council – DAC President Lion Denny Hilleren reported that DAC has a full board and meets by Zoom the 3rd Wednesday night of each month. DAC is trying to expand its activities before school starts, and move into other school districts to get the speech and essay contests running more quickly. Presentations have been requested by the Birdville, Grapevine-Colleyville and Southlake school districts. He noted that Clubs including Saginaw have really capitalized on these programs.

- f. Leader Dog – PDG John Paul reported that he is covering for Lion Keith Roberts, and they are available to give programs to Clubs.
- g. Lions Clubs International Foundation – DG Vince Rosen, for PDG Charles Bethards, reported that LCIF began the Campaign 100 program with a goal of \$300 million and ended with \$324.6 million raised and pledged. District 2-E2 gave \$71,000 last year, and with pledges provided about \$100,000.
- h. World Services for the Blind – IPDG Stan Hall announced that WSB will celebrate its 75th anniversary at dinner in Little Rock, AR on September 22. He has requested that CC Suzi Schneider request the MD-2 district governors to designate a WSB chair for each district.
- i. 2-E2 Eyeglass Recycling Center – VP Lion Mike Lueckenhoff presented the attached report.
- j. Lions Quest – Lion Juneria Berges presented the attached report.
- k. MD-2 Texas Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center – PDG John Paul Burnett reported the Midland facility is in a rebuilding phase. It accepts overflows of glasses from facilities across the state, including the 2-E2 ERC. There is no current CEO, but volunteers and a few paid individuals are keeping the facility operating. DG Vince Rosen commended PDG John Paul Burnett for his work with the TLERC and noted that he serves as Vice Chair of the TLERC board this year.

14. Committee Reports (presided by 2nd VDG Deb Lewis):

- a. Convention Chair – No report by 1st VDG Woody Mathews.
- b. State Convention – DG Vince Rosen reported that this had been discussed at the lunch session.
- c. Opportunities for Youth – 2nd VDG Deborah Lewis reported on the early activity regarding the scholarship contests, including the diabetes awareness essay contest and the drug awareness speech and poster contests. Only the International Peace Poster contest has guidance out currently (the theme is Lead with Compassion), but the remainder are expected by August 1. Lion Mike Lueckenhoff is looking for more judges for the contests.
- d. Diabetes Awareness – Diabetes Coordinator Sean Bryan reported on two events to be conducted by the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation in August and November for which Texas Lions Camp and the diabetes essay contest could send a representative if desired.
- e. Communications – PDG Tom Hayford reported for Communications Chair Lion Deb Cashen that she is trying to reduce e-mail blasts to two per month. He is assisting her on the website and requested that Clubs send him any information to be posted on the District website. He also noted that the information on the District website has been updated.

- f. USA/Canada Forum – 2nd VDG Deb Lewis noted that it will be held in Calgary, Canada on September 15-17, 2022.

15. Old Business – DG Vince Rosen noted that there is no old business.

16. New Business – DG Vince Rosen noted that there is no new business.

17. Closing Remarks by DG Vince Rosen.

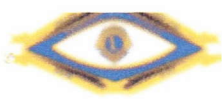

DISTRICT 2-E2 EYEGLASS RECYCLING CENTER

During the 2021-2022 Lions Year, the District 2-E2 Eyeglass Recycling Center shipped 67,350 pairs of glasses to missions and to the TLERC in Midland. This is quite an improvement from the previous year where we only shipped glasses to Midland and provided a small quantity to a jobs program affiliated with Presbyterian Night Shelter.

We still have a large inventory of raw glasses to process and work in a limited space which limits the scope of service we can provide. We continue to process single vision glasses through our facility and ship glasses with bifocal, trifocal, progressive and prism lenses to Midland for further processing. Our board has identified additional services we could and would like to provide in the future.

Last year about 3,000 service hours were volunteered at the ERC. Non-Lion volunteers (youth groups) continue to provide the bulk of volunteer hours at the center with limited involvement from District Clubs. We continue to encourage our District 2-E2 to volunteer at the ERC and are making direct appeals to Clubs.

The ERC is also offering to visit Clubs and provide a presentation on the ERC in Watauga. We are always looking for donations of money or goods. Lion Barbara Noblit has a wish list for things that we need from time to time.
